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Welcome: A Note to Parents

Your child just finished one chapter. High school is behind them. Now what?

Maybe college is part of their plan. Maybe it isn't. Maybe they have no idea what they want to do - and that is completely normal. What matters right now is that they do not drift. Drift is the enemy of a good launch.

This guide is short, honest, and built around one idea: young adults are more likely to thrive after high school when the adults in their lives stay engaged. Not controlling - engaged. They help their kids stay intentional, keep moving, keep stacking skills, and build real independence one step at a time.

We created CRF because we have walked this road ourselves - with our own kids. We have seen what works. We have seen what does not. This guide is the conversation we wish every parent and young adult could have together.

Your child does not need to have it all figured out. They just need to be working toward something - and they need you in their corner.

The Home Conversation

If your child is living at home after high school - whether for a month or a few years - your family needs to have an honest conversation. Not a vague "we will figure it out" talk. A real conversation with expectations on both sides.

This is not about control. It is about respect - for the young adult you are supporting and for the household you are running. A home works best as a launching pad, not a landing spot.

Topics to Discuss Together

- ✓ How long is this arrangement? What does the timeline look like?
- ✓ What are the financial expectations - rent, groceries, and bills?
- ✓ What does a productive weekly schedule look like?
- ✓ What are they working toward, and how can you support it?
- ✓ How will you handle conflict and regular check-ins?
- ✓ What does increasing independence look like at 6 months, 1 year, and 2 years?

Living at home after high school can be a smart financial and developmental strategy when expectations are clear. The difference between a young adult building momentum at home and slowly drifting often comes down to honest conversations, a schedule, and a visible next step.

You invested 18 years in your child. Most parents genuinely want to help them launch well. Be their resource and accountability partner, not only their safety net.

They Need a Job - Any Job

If a young adult is out of high school and is not already in college, training, caregiving, or another structured commitment, regular paid work needs to be part of the plan. Here is why:

- A job teaches you to show up, communicate, and perform under expectations - skills employers consistently value.
- It provides money, responsibility, and a chance to begin building independence.
- It puts you in contact with people, industries, and paths you would never discover sitting at home.
- It builds your resume - even part-time retail, food service, or seasonal work can demonstrate reliability and customer service.

You do not have to love the first job. You do have to learn from it and do it well. Many young adults discover career directions while working somewhere they never expected. Exposure creates information, confidence, and connections.

How Young Adults Often Find Their Direction

Career assessments and counselors have their place, but many people also find direction by taking action:

- They watch videos and follow questions that genuinely interest them.
- They work, meet people, and get exposed to fields they had never considered.
- They talk with family members, friends, and local workers doing real jobs.
- They attend job fairs, open houses, or trade events and discover unfamiliar careers.

Notice what is not on that list: waiting for perfect certainty. Clarity usually grows from exposure and action.



The Power of Job Fairs, Trade Shows & Conferences

One of the most underused tools for young adults is simply showing up where an industry gathers. Encourage your child to attend a local job fair, a trade show in a field that interests them, an employer open house, or a free regional event.

These events do something no website or career quiz can: they put real people, real jobs, and real possibilities in the same room. A single conversation can uncover an entry point, training route, or occupation a family did not know existed.

Real-World Paths Worth Exploring

Many young adults are surprised to discover how many strong paths exist outside the traditional "pick a major and hope it works out" model.

Some possibilities include:

- skilled trades and apprenticeships,
- employer-paid education and training,
- community-college and short-term technical programs,
- licensed and certification-based careers,
- seasonal and residential work,
- entrepreneurship and specialized sales,
- government, public-service, and military pathways.

The problem is rarely a complete lack of opportunity. More often, families have not yet been exposed to the available routes.

Money: The Advantage of Living at Home

Most young adults are never taught the basics of money, saving, or long-term financial thinking. As a parent, this is one of the most valuable conversations you can have during the years after high school.

For young adults living at home, this season can create a rare opportunity.

The Financial Window Many Young Adults Overlook

Living at home with lower expenses can provide a financial head start that becomes harder to create later.

During this window, they may be able to:

- save consistently,
- avoid unnecessary debt,
- build responsible spending habits,
- create an emergency cushion,
- and build financial momentum early.

Encourage your child to think intentionally about their money while this window is open.

The goal is not perfection. The goal is building habits that create long-term stability and increasing independence.



Building Financial Habits Early

The exact strategy matters less than learning how to:

- save consistently,
- spend intentionally,
- avoid lifestyle inflation,
- and think beyond the next paycheck.

Many families are surprised by how much progress a young adult can make in one or two years of intentional living at home. Simple habits practiced early often matter more than complicated systems later.

The Spending Conversation

Help your child become aware of three simple things:

- what comes in,
- what goes out,
- and what gets kept.

That awareness alone can begin changing the trajectory of a young adult's financial future.

Spending is not the enemy. Mindless spending is.

They will not live at home forever. Help them leave with a foundation - not just a suitcase.

Encourage Them to Move Away for a Season

One of the most valuable things a young adult can do before committing to a long-term direction is spend time somewhere new with real responsibilities.

Not simply traveling. Not drifting. Real work. Real people. Real experience.

For many young adults, a season away becomes the first time they fully learn how to:

- solve problems on their own,
- meet new people,
- adapt to unfamiliar situations,
- and build confidence outside their normal environment.

Experiences like these can create clarity in ways that sitting still rarely does. Growth can happen quickly when a young adult enters a new environment with responsibility and structure.

Possibilities include:

- seasonal programs such as the Disney College Program,
- national park jobs and other seasonal positions,
- residential work programs that include housing,
- service programs such as AmeriCorps,
- working-abroad, cultural-exchange, and TEFL pathways.

Our own daughter was shy and hesitant before completing a program like this. She returned more confident, independent, and much more certain about her direction.

Skills That Will Set Them Apart

A four-year degree is valuable for some careers, but it is not the only way to become capable, employable, and successful. Every path requires skills - and those skills are more accessible than ever.

The Human-Skills Gap Is Real

Employers repeatedly identify these qualities as important, especially for workers starting out:

- communication,
- reliability,
- initiative,
- professionalism,
- adaptability and problem-solving.

These skills are not flashy, but they matter in nearly every career. Becoming dependable, coachable, and willing to learn can set a young worker apart before they have years of experience.

The challenge is often not finding information. It is choosing what matters for one exact goal, verifying the route, and continuing to take action.

The most employable young adults are often the ones who keep learning even when nobody is requiring them to.

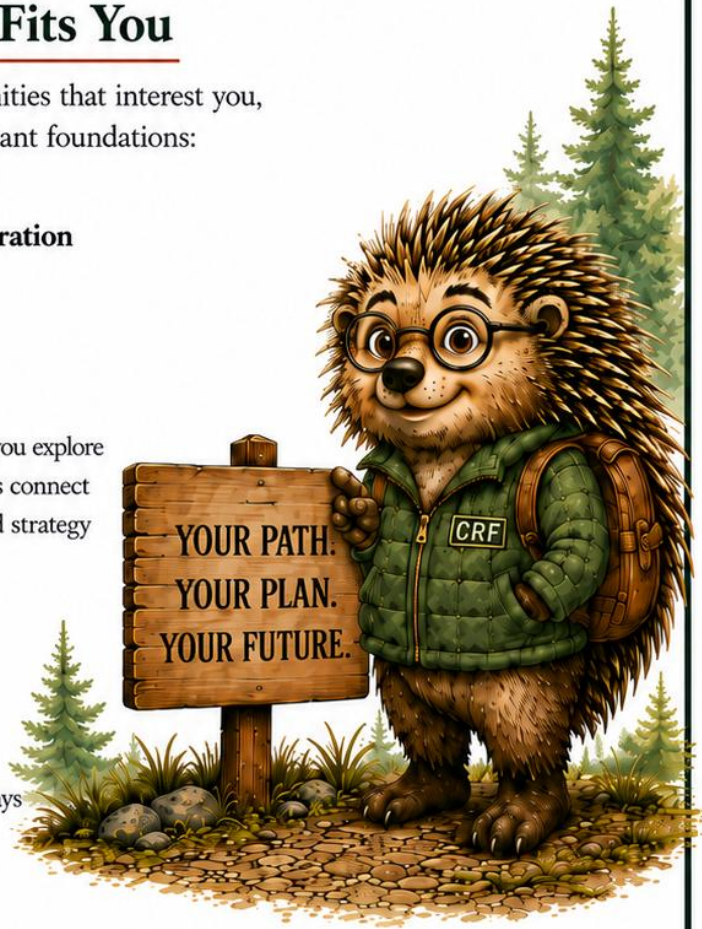
